

#### Here's a fun Masonic fact for your day:

To date, every President of the United States who has hailed from the state of Tennessee has also been a Freemason. These are Presidents Jackson, Johnson, and Polk.

On March 9th, 1819, as the Masons of Washington Lodge No. 59 in Philadelphia, PA met, a chimney fire spread throughout the building, engulfing it in flames. Standing for only eight years before burning down, it was the first Masonic temple erected in the city. Residents of New Castle, Delaware claimed they could see the flames 32 miles away.

### Abbott Scholarship

Every year, the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction awards over 400 scholarships to worthy students to help them realize their dreams of furthering their educations and thus promoting the Masonic Fraternity's foundation of the importance of an educated mind and the capacity to promote the liberal arts. In conjunction with this program, the Valley of Wilmington and the Valley of Lower Delaware encourage you and/or your children and/or grandchildren, nephews and/or nieces to apply for one of the many local scholarships made available through the Abbott Scholarship Fund.



The eligibility to apply are as follows . . .

- A Scottish Rite Mason in the Valley of Wilmington or the Valley of Lower Delaware;
- A student directly related (bloodline or by legal means) to a living or deceased Scottish Rite Mason in the Valley of Wilmington or the Valley of Lower Delaware;
- A member of a youth organization sponsored by the Masonic fraternity in the Valley of Wilmington or the Valley of Lower Delaware.

#### Additionally, the qualifying student must be ONE of the following:

- A high school senior, currently accepted at an accredited college, university, or trade school who has attained a minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale;
- An undergraduate or graduate student currently enrolled at an accredited college or university.

Applicants in our jurisdiction must submit their completed application forms to the Secretary of the Valley of Wilmington, along with <u>ALL</u> appropriate supporting materials (professional goal statement, letter of recommendation, current transcripts, and current Student Aid Report (SAR)) to Bro. James Brady, Secretary / AASR - Valley of Wilmington / 818 N. Market Street / 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor / Wilmington, DE 19801-3077. All materials <u>MUST</u> be received no later than <u>April 15</u>, 2021.


there?), what are you doing to relieve the distressed?


If you are looking to learn more about the history of Freemasonry or Masonic teachings and symbols, why not do it the old-fashioned way? Get started with a few of our favorites:
