

# **Reunion Number 2**

The Valley of Wilmington has its second reunion of the 2023 – 24 Scottish Rite calendar scheduled for Saturday, November 18, 2023 at 818 N. Market Street, 4<sup>th</sup> floor. Doors open at 7:30 a.m. Candidates are to report to the 4<sup>th</sup> floor at 8:00 a.m. to sign in and to meet the brethren ahead of viewing the 4<sup>th</sup> degree if needed. The opening of the reunion by the Wilmington Lodge of Perfection is at 9:00 a.m.

The degrees presented will be the 15<sup>th</sup> degree (Knight of the East) on stage, the 27<sup>th</sup> degree (Knight of Jerusalem) via video, and the 30<sup>th</sup> degree (Grand Inspector) via video.

The Knight of the East is the first of two Historical degrees presented by the Council Princes of Jerusalem. In the Allegories of the Fifteenth and Sixteenth Degrees, we are taught, by the example of Zerubbabel, the important lessons of to conviction, fidelity to duty, devotion to Truth and the important core value of Integrity.

The Knight of Jerusalem is based on an historical incident in the lives of Emperor Federick, II and his former tutor, Pope Honorious III. Upon his coronation in 1215, Frederick promised to lead a crusade to free the Holy Land from the enemies of the Christian Church. The core value of Justice and Toleration is exemplified.

The Grand Inspector is a trial scene of a Knight in a Civil Court in England in the 14th century, during the reign of Edward II. The lesson he learns is in the hard school of experience as a defendant through the bar of Justice.

Giving Tuesday - <u>A Night of Charity</u> will feature:



### The Configuration of the PA Masonic Hall in 1819



The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania secured its first building in 1802. Located on Filbert Street in Philadelphia, members dedicated it on St. John's Day (December 27) in 1802. However, membership in Freemasonry grew at such a rate over the succeeding years that the building soon was too small. By 1807, the search was on for new quarters. Later that year, the Grand Lodge purchased a vacant lot on Chestnut Street and began building according to a plan that architect William Strickland (1787-1854) submitted to their design competition. The new Masonic Hall was completed in 1809.

Unfortunately, the Grand Lodge would experience a relatively short tenure in this building. On March 9, 1819, a chimney fire spread rapidly, consuming the building. An engraving from the National Heritage Museum's collection, entitled The Conflagration of the Masonic Hall, Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, and created by John Lewis Krimmel (1786-1821) and John Hill (1770-1850), depicts the scene. The Grand Lodge history explains that "so great was the interest taken by the general public in this great calamity which overtook the Brethren," that a painting was done "for the purpose of having an engraving made of the conflagration." <u>Read more here . . .</u>
