

Reunion Number 2

The Valley of Wilmington has its second reunion of the 2023 - 24 Scottish Rite calendar scheduled for Saturday, November 18, 2023 at 818 N. Market Street, 4^{th} floor. Doors open at 7:30 a.m. Candidates are to report to the 4^{th} floor at 8:00 a.m. to sign in and to meet the brethren ahead of viewing the 4^{th} degree if needed. The opening of the reunion by the Wilmington Lodge of Perfection is at 9:00 a.m.

The degrees presented will be the 15th degree (Knight of the East) on stage, the 27th degree (Knight of Jerusalem) via video, and the 30th degree (Grand Inspector) via video.

The Knight of the East is the first of two Historical degrees presented by the Council Princes of Jerusalem. In the Allegories of the Fifteenth and Sixteenth Degrees, we are taught, by the example of Zerubbabel, the important lessons of to conviction, fidelity to duty, devotion to Truth and the important core value of Integrity.

The Knight of Jerusalem is based on an historical incident in the lives of Emperor Federick, II and his former tutor, Pope Honorious III. Upon his coronation in 1215, Frederick promised to lead a crusade to free the Holy Land from the enemies of the Christian Church. The core value of Justice and Toleration is exemplified.

The Grand Inspector is a trial scene of a Knight in a Civil Court in England in the 14th century, during the reign of Edward II. The lesson he learns is in the hard school of experience as a defendant through the bar of Justice.





Now on View: 300 Years of Anderson's Constitutions



This year, 2023, marks the three hundredth anniversary of the printing of *The Constitutions of the Free-Masons*, a book that codified the earliest rules and regulations of organized Freemasonry. To mark the occasion, the <u>Scottish Rite Masonic Museum & Library</u> has brought together seven editions

of the Constitutions in a reading room exhibition, "300 Years of Anderson's Constitutions."

The Grand Lodge system of organized Freemasonry can be traced back to the 1717 founding of the Grand Lodge of England in London. The group published its first Constitutions in 1723. This work contained a mythologized history of Freemasonry, as well as the group's Charges and Regulations, a set of rules governing lodges and the expected behavior of Masons. Although often referred to as "Anderson's Constitutions," after one of its authors, today, the 1723 Constitutions is viewed as the work of three people—the Reverend James Anderson (1679-1739), the Reverend Dr. John Theophilus Desaguliers (1683-1744), and George Payne (ca. 1685-1757).

The 1723 *Constitutions* begins with a "traditional history" of Freemasonry, written by Anderson. This narrative fancifully traces Freemasonry back to the biblical Adam in the Garden of Eden. Anderson's history was intended—and should be read—as literary hyperbole, created to burnish the young organization by giving it a place within a well-known narrative. Following this is a section setting out rules and regulations governing who could join, as well as the Enlightenment principles of meritocracy and egalitarianism governing Freemasons. FROM THE SOUTH . . .

As we inch our way through November, many images cross my mind, both Masonic and otherwise. Foremost is that November is the month of Thanksgiving, where our actions and thoughts should center around giving thanks for what we have and the people

we have in our lives, but also thinking of how we can give to others who might not have the resources and means that we might. The Masonic fraternity, in particular, the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of the Southern Jurisdiction, celebrates the Feast of Tishri around this time every year. The significance of the Feast of Tishri rests on three factors: First, the wandering of the children of Israel in the wilderness for forty years; Second, the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple; and Third, the harvesting time and thanksgiving to God for his blessings and bounty.

November 30th is also the feast day of St. Andrew, the namesake of the Knights of St. Andrew, a service organization of the Scottish Rite, that exists to provide help and support for Masonic activities throughout the state. Andrew, an apostle of Jesus, was a fisherman, and one of the first disciples of Jesus, who fervently followed Jesus, spreading the Word throughout the lands that they visited. He was crucified by the Romans in Greece on a X-shaped cross, which he specifically requested as he thought himself unworthy to die on a similar cross to that of Jesus. The X- shaped cross has since become his distinctive symbol as well as the symbol and flag of Scotland, of which he is the patron.

As I look back over the last twelve months, I certainly have much to be thankful for, namely my family and friends, and relatively good health. I also owe a debt of gratitude to my Masonic family, especially the Scottish Rite, who has taken this good person, and hopefully made him a little better, and who continually strives to fulfill that goal.
