What Degrees Are Presented?

The Scottish Rite, NMJ expands on the degrees of the blue lodge, offering the 4°-32°. Our Thursday Night at the Rite events rotate through these degrees with the exception of the 32°, which is reserved for special celebratory events and in-person Reunions. Each degree presented at Thursday Night at the Rite is eligible for passport credit.

Our production team has taken great measures to bring a one-of-a-kind, cinematic experience to each presentation, traveling onsite to various Valleys to film the degrees live. These productions are far beyond a home video, capturing the unique attributes that each Valley's presentation offers.



For those who have already started their Pathfinder journey, or for those interested in beginning their path, there are 6 Waypoints that help one progress through the program with numerous Mile Markers under each Waypoint that will guide you in learning all about our Rite in general and your Valley in particular.

The Six Waypoints are: Organization, Self-improvement, Valley Life, Enrichment Programs, Service and Philosophy, and Choice. Under Organization, there are 18 Mile Markers of which you need to complete 6. Under Self-Improvement, there are 22 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Valley Life, there are 24 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Enrichment Programs, there are 14 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Service and Philosophy, there are 27 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Choice, you may go back and complete any two additional Mile Markers from any of the Waypoints.


There are Field Guides and Workbooks you can use to keep track of your progress, BUT there is also a Pathfinder Digital portal on-line where you can track your progress electronically.

A B'nai B'rith Token of Generosity



B'nai B'rith Identification Tag, 1927. United States. Gift of Nancy S. Lynn in Memory of John A. Lynn, 99.049.28.

This small metal item in the collection of the Scottish Rite Masonic Museum & Library features a menorah with the numbers "1927." It is an identification tag produced by the International Order of B'nai B'rith, one of the largest Jewish organizations in the world. This tag was a symbol of the owner's charitable donations through the organization.

B'nai B'rith, which means "Children of the Covenant" in Hebrew, was established in New York, New York, in 1843 by a group of German Jewish immigrants. Some of its goals as a fraternal organization were "alleviating the wants of the poor and needy," "visiting and attending the sick," and "providing

for, protecting, and assisting the widow and the orphan," as described in its constitution. The group evolved into a general charitable and service organization in the early 1900s. B'nai B'rith is the oldest national Jewish organization in the United States.

Its Wider Scope Program, begun in 1927 as this tag illustrates, helped fund major initiatives in the United States and abroad. Two of these were the now-independent Anti-Defamation League and Hillel International, a program for Jewish university students. Expanding charitable and human rights work internationally continued to be a goal of B'nai B'rith. Earning non-governmental organization (NGO) status in 1947, it was the first Jewish organization to have regular, full representation at the United Nations.

The reverse of this tag identifies the owner as subscriber number 3072 to the Wider Scope program that supported B'nai Brith's projects. This subscriber was John A. Lynn (1861-1945), from North Jackson, Ohio. Lynn's granddaughter gave this token, and other items related to Lynn's involvement in Masonic and fraternal organizations to the museum in 1999.

Lynn had a full life in Ohio—marrying his wife Jessie Patchin in 1896, parenting two children, and working as an insurance agent. In addition to his membership in B'nai B'rith, he was also a Freemason, Shriner, and Knight Templar, as shown in <u>this image</u>, from the same gift to the museum. This small tag is a tangible sign of Lynn's generosity.

LEON M. ABBOTT SCHOLARSHIPS

"Helping those who most need it strive for greater heights"

The Supreme Council is pleased to announce an expansion of the eligibility criteria for Abbott Scholarship awards. Named for Leon M. Abbott, Sovereign Grand Commander from 1921 to 1932, the Abbott Scholarship Program provides financial support for the continuing undergraduate and graduate education of Scottish Rite Masons, young men and women from Scottish Rite families, and Masonic related youth groups.



Eligibility: Those meeting any of the following criteria are eligible to apply for the Abbott Scholarship program:

- 🏶 A Scottish Rite Mason of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction who is in good standing.
- A student directly related (bloodline or by legal means) to a current or deceased Scottish Rite Mason in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
- A member of a Masonic sponsored youth group located in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

In addition, the applicant must be either:

- A high school senior, currently accepted at an accredited trade school or college or university who has attained a minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale OR
- An undergraduate or graduate student currently enrolled at an accredited trade school or college or university.

To apply, applicants should print the form, complete it, and mail it to the appropriate Valley secretary (Jack McDuff – VOLD or Steve Tucker VOW) received by April 15, 2025. Applicants should submit their application to the Valley of the sponsor of the applicant.

Rite on the Road 1/16/2025

On Thursday, January 16, 2025, the Valley of Wilmington conducted a Rite on the Road at Jackson Lodge #19. We were able to bring 9 Brothers into the Scottish Rite. Candidates began showing up at 630. Brother Alex Boothe and Illustrious David Walters had already set things up and were ready to go. Brother Alex provided Pizza for the event.

We started off with a general information session where we reviewed the four bodies of the Rite and the Knights of St. Andrew. We talked about how the degrees were broken down by body and highlighted the groupings. We discussed the role of the KSA in the valley and all that they do for us.

We then opened the Valley, read the Oath of Fealty and the Declaration of Principles. The valley was declared open by III David Walters 33°, MSA HGA and a prayer given at 7:00. We then viewed the 4th degree. Upon completion of the degree we discussed the Core Values and how they applied to the degree.

After this discussion we viewed the 26th degree, Friend and Brother Eternal. We then discussed the Core Values again and their thoughts on the degree. They each affirmed their desire to be active in the Valley and we discussed the road to the 32°. We also discussed the achievement that is the 32°, and the importance in it for our individual masonic journeys. We closed the Works of the Valley at approximately 830pm.


