

Each season of Thursday Night at the Rite, the Supreme Council invites Brothers from across our 15-state jurisdiction to gather online to watch one of our inspiring degree productions, with the featured degree presentation changing every other week.

Each degree presentation allows members to connect with and learn from each other as they continue along their path towards more light.

What Degrees Are Presented?

The Scottish Rite, NMJ expands on the degrees of the blue lodge, offering the 4°-32°. Our Thursday Night at the Rite events rotate through these degrees with the exception of the 32°, which is reserved for special celebratory events and in-person Reunions. Each degree presented at Thursday Night at the Rite is eligible for passport credit.

Our production team has taken great measures to bring a one-of-a-kind, cinematic experience to each presentation, traveling onsite to various Valleys to film the degrees live. These productions are far beyond a home video, capturing the unique attributes that each Valley's presentation offers.



For those who have already started their Pathfinder journey, or for those interested in beginning their path, there are 6 Waypoints that help one progress through the program with numerous Mile Markers under each Waypoint that will guide you in learning all about our Rite in general and your Valley in particular.

The Six Waypoints are: Organization, Self-improvement, Valley Life, Enrichment Programs, Service and Philosophy, and Choice. Under Organization, there are 18 Mile Markers of which you need to complete 6. Under Self-Improvement, there are 22 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Valley Life, there are 24 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Enrichment Programs, there are 14 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Service and Philosophy, there are 27 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Choice, you may go back and complete any two additional Mile Markers from any of the Waypoints.



Protest & Promise: The American Revolution in Lexington

This print, a propagandized depiction of the Boston Massacre engraved by Paul Revere, was widely circulated. Downplaying the fact that the soldiers responded in self-defense, Revere sought to steer public opinion against Great Britain.

On April 19, 1775, Massachusetts colonists engaged in battle with British soldiers. A dawn skirmish on Lexington's town common was followed by a larger conflict in Concord. Eventually, thousands of people fought a running battle which raged through several towns throughout the day. After years of tension between Great Britain and its North American colonies, the events of April 19th broke long-held bonds and ignited the American Revolutionary War.

Rights and Liberties

Colonists protested strenuously when they felt their rights were threatened by their government in Great Britain in the 1760s and 1770s. They underscored these protests with actions both large and small. Later, many lost their lives and property during the eight-year-long war for independence. After winning their freedom, Americans sought to build a country that, as asserted in the Declaration of Independence, promised its citizens "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness."

Common Cause

In an unprecedented moment in 1775, ordinary people in Lexington made extraordinary choices. An entire community—women, men, black, white, young, old, enslaved, and free—helped spark a revolution. Today, 250 years later, Americans continue to remember April 19, 1775 as a moment when everyday people shaped history. To mark this important anniversary, the Scottish Rite Masonic Museum & Library is opening "Protest & Promise: The American Revolution in Lexington." The exhibition explores the events of April 19, 1775, with images, objects, and an in-depth look at this watershed event and how it has been remembered.





LEON M. ABBOTT SCHOLARSHIPS

"Helping those who most need it strive for greater heights"

The Supreme Council is pleased to announce an expansion of the eligibility criteria for Abbott Scholarship awards. Named for Leon M. Abbott, Sovereign Grand Commander from 1921 to 1932, the Abbott Scholarship Program provides financial support for the continuing undergraduate and graduate education of Scottish Rite Masons, young men and women from Scottish Rite families, and Masonic related youth groups.

Eligibility: Those meeting any of the following criteria are eligible to apply for the Abbott Scholarship program:



- A Scottish Rite Mason of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction who is in good standing.
- A student directly related (bloodline or by legal means) to a current or deceased Scottish Rite Mason in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
- A member of a Masonic sponsored youth group located in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

In addition, the applicant must be either:

- A high school senior, currently accepted at an accredited trade school or college or university who has attained a minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale OR
- An undergraduate or graduate student currently enrolled at an accredited trade school or college or university.

To apply, applicants should print the form, complete it, and mail it to the appropriate Valley secretary (Jack McDuff – VOLD or Steve Tucker VOW) received by April 15, 2025. Applicants should submit their application to the Valley of the sponsor of the applicant.




This year's Family Life event saw sixty-five members their families attend Clear Space

Active Emeritus Member for this Supreme Council for the state of Delaware died on January 31, 2025





Albert Roscoe Marshall was born in Thomaston, Maine on January 15, 1935, the only child of Kenneth W. and Blanche (Tibbetts) Marshall. He is a 1956 graduate of Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Maine and holds a Bachelor of Arts (cum laude) in American History. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He also earned a Master's degree in Business Administration from the University of Delaware in 1967.

On October 25, 1958, Albert married Joan Marie Bauer in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. They have two sons, Craig Alan and Scott Roger.

Following graduation from Bowdoin, Albert served in the United States Army. He then joined the Finance Department of E. I. DuPont Nemours & Company in Wilmington, Delaware. During a career of over 34 years, he held various financial management positions within the company and retired in 1992. While employed, Albert continued his military service in the Reserve Components, retiring in 1986 with the rank of Colonel after 30 years of Active and Reserve service.

He holds numerous awards and decorations including the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Army Commendation Medal, the Humanitarian Service Medal and the Army Achievement Medal. Albert was the Secretary-Treasurer of the Lombardy Hall Foundation for 35 years. He also served as President and Chairman of the Delaware Senior Olympics. Albert was predeceased by his first wife, Joan Bauer Marshall. He is survived by his wife, Frances Vaughn Marshall; his sons, Craig (Elaine) of Chuluota, Florida, and Scott (Crystal) of Roanoke, Virginia; and granddaughters Hannah, Nicole, and Taylor.

Funeral and Masonic Services were held at the Doherty Funeral Home in Pike Creek, Delaware on February 14, 2025. Internment with military honors took place at the Delaware Veterans Memorial Cemetery in Bear, Delaware following the services.
