

For those who have already started their Pathfinder journey, or for those interested in beginning their path, there are 6 Waypoints that help one progress through the program with numerous Mile Markers under each Waypoint that will guide you in learning all about our Rite in general and your Valley in particular.

The Six Waypoints are: Organization, Self-improvement, Valley Life, Enrichment Programs, Service and Philosophy, and Choice. Under Organization, there are 18 Mile Markers of which you need to complete 6. Under Self-Improvement, there are 22 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Valley Life, there are 24 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Enrichment Programs, there are 14 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Service and Philosophy, there are 27 Mile Markers of which you must complete 6. Under Choice, you may go back and complete any two additional Mile Markers from any of the Waypoints.

There are Field Guides and Workbooks you can use to keep track of your progress, BUT there is also a Pathfinder Digital portal on-line where you can track your progress electronically.



If you were traveling along your pathfinder program with me you should need two more mile markers to complete your program. Here they are. Congratulations!!

PF-ORG_15: What are the official caps worn within the Scottish Rite, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction? What are their colors and what do they represent? Record your findings in your Field Book entry.

Answer: Black caps represent 32nd degree master masons and the general membership of the Scottish Rite

Blue Caps represent Aids or a member of the service group

Yellow Caps denote that one is a live officer in either the Lodge of Perfection, Council Princes of Jerusalem, Chapter of Rose Croix, or one's Consistory.

Red Caps are members selected for the Meritorious Service Award denoting a member's hard work and dedicated service to the Rite

White Caps are members selected to be Honorary Members of Supreme Council and denote extra ordinary service and leadership in a Valley

Purple Caps are Active Members of Supreme Council and are responsible for overseeing Valleys and representing Supreme Council in those Valleys as well as serving on committees out of Supreme Council.


Answer: It is the annual Scottish Rite Memorial Service honoring those who have passed to the Lodge Eternal and performed by the Chapter of Rose Croix. It is based on the belief that Christ died for our sins representing the Passover Lamb commemorating both Easter and the Passover ever reminding us that the soul is immortal and the bonds of fraternal love cannot be severed by the passing of time.

Remembering the Battle of Bunker Hill:


This pocket-size booklet was intended for tourists visiting the monument. While still a memorial to the battle, the Bunker Hill Monument also functioned, as it does today, as a tourist attraction, affording those who climb its 294 steps expansive views of Boston, Charlestown, Cambridge, Malden, Chelsea, and Lynn.

This year marks the 250th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and the 200th anniversary of the laying of the Bunker Hill Monument's cornerstone. To commemorate this event, the Scottish Rite Masonic Museum & Library's Van Gorden-Williams Library & Archives is featuring a small exhibition in its reading room, with objects related to memorializing the Battle of Bunker Hill.

The Battle of Bunker Hill took place on June 17, 1775. Despite the name of the battle, most of the action took place on nearby Breed's Hill.

Combatants fought the battle to solidify which side controlled Boston Harbor. To this end, the hills in and around Boston were tactically important to both British and colonial forces. The American's newly formed Continental Army sought to limit the supplies that the British army could bring into Boston via the harbor.

Objects on view in "Remembering the Battle of Bunker Hill" include a nineteenth-century scale model of the original 1794 monument erected by King Solomon's Lodge of Charlestown,



Masons representing Grand Lodges and other Masonic organizations throughout New England and beyond gathered on June 24, 1845, for the dedication of a scale model of the original 26-foot tall 1794 monument. Freemason Thomas Power – a musician, music critic, and one of the earliest members of the Handel and Haydn Society – wrote this ode, which was sung as part of the ceremony. An illustration of the original monument adorns the cover of this sheet music.

Massachusetts. Lodge members dedicated the monument to the memory of Revolutionary War hero and organizer Joseph Warren, who was killed in the battle. Other objects on view include two pieces of sheet music related to dedicatory events surrounding the Bunker Hill Monument, including a "Masonic Ode" composed in 1845, as well as seeds used in the Masonic cornerstone laying ceremony for the Bunker Hill Monument in 1825.

While still a memorial to the battle, the Bunker Hill Monument also functioned and continues to do so today—as a tourist attraction. A climb up its 294 steps affords visitors expansive views of Boston, Charlestown, Cambridge, Malden, Chelsea, and Lynn. Two nineteenth-century booklets, both intended for tourists visiting the monument, are also on view in the exhibition.

"Remembering the Battle of Bunker Hill" will be on view in the Van Gorden-Williams Library & Archives' reading room through October 3, 2025.






SCOTTISH RITE NOW OFFERS DUES AUTO-PAY!
